Dr Wee and his peers of pioneer businesspeople belong to a rare breed of tough-minded shrewd entrepreneurs. They never stop thinking of business and looking for business opportunities. They are skillful in amassing wealth. But money-making is never their sole purpose in life.

The more important and overriding purpose is to contribute to Society, to Nation Building. Take a look around you, you will find many magnificent buildings put up by Dr Wee that add to the beauty of our landscape. He has also provided tens of thousands of employment opportunities that contribute towards our economy! Of the many what can only be described as awesome undertakings of Dr Wee, UOI is likely among the smallest in terms of size of investment.

Yes, it is small relatively but to me a lifelong insurance practitioner believing in the pride of nationalism and local ownership, it is big in Symbolic Significance as it represents the indomitable spirit of Singaporeans!
